Welcome to our second edition of the WCCT Since the last newsletter we have completed our first round of Community visits with the next round planned for July.

The much anticipated Strategic Plan for the Western Cape Communities Trust and the Western Cape Communities Coordinating Committee was finalised and has been sent out to all shareholders and distributed to many of our stakeholders. Importantly the plan addresses the aspirations of Traditional Owners in 5 key objective areas and outlines short and medium term goals. As Executive Officer my task is to deliver on these aspirations for Traditional Owners and I set my work goals on achieving these.

The Achimbun land purchase is taking longer than anticipated due to issues between Rio

process of selecting a project manager for the construction of the new Administration Centre, Traditional Owner Meeting venue and the Elders Area including a keeping place for the many artefacts, photos and documents which Rio Tinto is holding in safe keeping for the Trust.

We have initiated a conversation with Rio Tinto and the State Government on land relinguishment and land handback and have established a working party to oversee this important issue for Traditional Owners. Stage one of this process will be having the State Government through the Department of Natural Resources and Mines set the end and is ready to be handed back to Traditional Owners. We will update you as this very important issue progresses.

Grant Funding Guidelines:

Each February Directors of each of the Sub-Regional Trusts meet to set the budget and rules that will apply for applications for grants to be funded by the Sub-Trusts for the coming year.

Issues that are considered are based on the applications received in the previous year and specific areas where Shareholders have identified there is a need. The Directors also consider the requests from the Communities through their Councils for specific Community Development projects.

The Directors also need to give particular consideration to the legal rules that apply due to the Sub-Trusts having Tax Exempt Status and Religion: to protect that status.

These legal rules are quite specific when it comes to what funding the Sub-Trusts can support and recently, a workshop was held with our legal representatives who visited Weipa and thoroughly explained to the Sub-Regional Trust Directors what they can legally fund.

Under the legislation that governs what we can fund, funding must come under one of four main headings and all conditions that apply to each of these headings must be complied with in every grant funded there can be no exceptions!

The four tax exempt funding headings:

Each grant must fall under one of these four headings and satisfy the conditions attached to each of these headings.

These headings, and their conditions, are as follows:

Relief of Poverty:

Under this heading, applicants MUST show that they cannot afford the particular funding that they request.

Funding for Whitegoods and Household Goods falls under this heading and to establish that there is a real financial need, the Australian Tax Office accepts that the production of a Centrelink statement showing that the applicant receives income tested Government benefits satisfies this requirement. Income tested Government benefits include NewStart, Age or Disability Pension and other similar benefits. Family Benefit A or B is not income tested and therefore does NOT satisfy this requirement.

This heading can also support funding for people who are of old age or

who are disabled and cannot afford items which would assist them with the problems associated with their age or disability. Just because an applicant is old is not sufficient - they must demonstrate that they cannot afford the item that would be of benefit to them.

Education:

The Sub-Trusts can support applications for assistance with education expenses related to Primary, Secondary or Tertiary education so long as the funding is for items that are NOT funded by Government. In 2015, the three Sub-Trusts approved \$1,721,761.00 in Educational Bursaries.

Applications can be considered for funding under this heading which can be shown to support religion which includes the cultural beliefs of our Traditional Owners.

Funding for Sorry Business and for Tombstones and related activities fall under this heading.

Community Support:

Funding for projects or activities which benefit the Community AS A WHOLE can also be considered.

These projects or activities must be of benefit to all, or a major part, of the Community.

Items which come under this heading are identified as being "Community Wellbeing" in the Grant Funding Guidelines.

Applications from Councils and Community sporting teams or similar organisations can be considered under this heading.

As a final comment, the Sub-Trusts cannot support funding applications for projects which have any commercial aspect - we CANNOT consider applications from businesses or to commence or support any business activity.

Cultural Awareness Training (CAT)

As per the Western Cape Communities Coexistence Agreement (WCCCA) Rio Tinto is obligated to institute the Cultural Awareness Training (CAT) program for employees of Rio Tinto and employees of Rio Tinto Contractors. In providing CAT to all employees, including supervisors and managers, the obligation is to employ and involve Local Aboriginal Persons in instituting and conducting the CAT program.

The Western Cape Centre provides the venue and services for the delivery of CAT to Rio Tinto. Once On Friday 10 June 2016 the first session of CAT a month a CAT session is run for all new employees of Rio Tinto Weipa and this session runs for 1.5 days.

Also in partnership with the Traditional Owners, Rio Tinto Weipa and the WCCT have designed and developed CAT refresher modules for all existing staff of Rio Tinto

Weipa and an online CAT module for contractors, Category 1 and 2, as part of the contractor's online induction process.

The first CAT refresher module to be delivered is the Refresher Modular 1 "History and Languages of the Western Cape" and runs for four hours. This CAT refresher will be delivered over 2016 and 2017 with all Rio Tinto Weipa shift workers completing their refresher CAT in 2016. Following in 2017 all Rio Tinto Weipa Monday to Friday workers will complete the same CAT refresher.

Refresher Modular 1 was delivered by the Western Cape Centre. This is the first session of 22 scheduled sessions for 2016 where it is expected that 852 Rio Tinto Weipa shift workers will receive re-

The CAT is led by Florence Charger of the Western Cape Centre and supported by other Traditional

Owners as co presenters.

The Centre will focus on increasing the number of Traditional Owners to be involved in the CAT which will provide additional employment for Traditional

CAT is very important to help people and businesses gain a better understanding of the culture of the Western Cape Region, why the cultural history is important and why the Traditional Owners ask that vou respect it.

CAT also provides the opportunity to better understand the cultural differences and cultural similarities of the people who live and work in the region.

The Traditional Owners, WCCT and Rio Tinto Weipa will continue to work in partnership to further develop CAT and ensure the significance of Cultural Awareness is addressed and delivered.

Bursary Holiday Work Experience Program

The Western Cape Communities Trust (WCCT) supports a number of students to attend boarding schools from the communithat come under the ties WCCCA.

For the last 2 years, WCCT in collaboration with Rio Tinto Weipa have developed a structured school to work pathways program for LAP and Traditional Owner students who attend boarding school and receive WCCCA Bursaries.

The school to work program is designed to offer bursary students with information on different career options that would be available to the students within the mining sector once they have completed their schooling.

Over the last 2 years that the program has been running, there

have been a couple of Traditional Owner students who were part of the school to work holiday bursary holiday program that have gained employment with Rio Tinto in Weipa.

The holiday work experience program can also look at students undertaking work experience in one of the Rio Tinto Mine sites in Queensland. E.g. Rio Tinto Brisbane Office or Gladstone Mine Site.

Rio Tinto Weipa has scheduled a work experience program for the week commencing 12 September 2016. Rio Tinto Weipa will deliver hands on work experience programs for the students in their nominated field to ensure each student engages in a meaningful program that is aligned with potential employment and or further education activities.

Should you need to complete an "A" Class Shareholder form, it needs to be completed and returned to the WCCT Office before the 10 July 2016. Once you have been approved as an "A" Class Shareholder, you can nominate yourself for the elections and/or vote. The AEC will be conducting the WCCCA Elections and contacting all 'A' Class Shareholders with WCCCA Election information packs later this year.


